

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

• The importance of aligning your business model with your life and belief system is consistently immaculately executed. 


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Romance PREVAILS AND it's PERFECT.





We are both big music lovers, so the music was another big highlight of the entire evening. We chose five different musicians to play with this one band, so there was music constantly happening. Anthony really curated the music to a T. The other thing that we did was to encourage our loved ones to sing a song or jam with the band, because we have so many friends in the industry. So it was really special to have that. Bunmi, who's my vice president at NKPR—she sang a song. Our friend Joey Scoleri, who worked for Live Nation, sang a beautiful song. So there were all these special moments.

Another highlight: We are both big foodies, but I'm not a "fancy" foodie—so we had things like Dairy Queen Blizzards as a snack. We had Fidel Gastro; Matt Basile from Lisa Marie—he was our caterer. So it was really a little bit unexpected. We really curated the food so that we considered what everyone loves to eat. I'm a big '80s dessert fan, so Jos Louis, candies, all of that. I chose all the different candy that was there, I worked with bake shops to come up with these Jos Louis type of desserts. We also had Loblaw's white cakes, because that's my favourite cake. We didn't go fancy, we just really looked at things that were genuinely important to us. Last but not least, for officiants, we looked at who would be interesting to officiate at this ceremony, who was in our lives when we first met, because we have only been together just over two years. Our friends Craig Lawrence and Lark, from New York, officiated for us. We went to New York about ten days after we met, because it's sort of my home away from home; and they were the first people I introduced Anthony to, and they officiated our wedding.

• I want to touch specifically on your dress. You can't walk into just any bridal boutique and find this incredible dress. How did you choose it, and what was the process you went through to arrive at this remarkable gown?

Well, it was interesting. I go to a lot of evening events, so I have a lot of black evening gowns, and I wanted it not to feel like an evening

gown. I wanted it to truly feel like a wedding gown. And I really believe there's no one that designs wedding dresses like Vera Wang. There are a lot of amazing designers out there that do beautiful evening wear, but the way she designs and corsets a dress is like no other—truly. Every gown feels like a couture gown, so I flew to New York and went to a few different places. I went to Zuhair Murad and actually one of my gowns was from Zuhair when I originally planned on wearing three gowns—but by the second gown, I was just like "Nope, I'm putting on my jeans and T-shirt." I also went to Naeem Khan and found beautiful dresses and actually bought one just for an event, but they weren't quite the dress. I went to Vera Wang and I saw a dress that I liked, and it was similar to the one I ended up having made, but it needed to be modified. I worked with Vera Wang on really modifying the dress to the way I wanted it—obviously making it more black and really tailoring it the way I need it. I actually ended up doing two dresses from Vera Wang; my second gown for the reception was also from Vera Wang.

It is the way she designs and the way she corsets, there's something about it. She started as a wedding dress designer, I believe. It's just a different way of corseting, and you feel different. I really did feel like I was wearing a dress for my wedding, as opposed to just a beautiful gown for an event. That was really what I was going for. The other thing about it I think that was interesting for me, I knew I was going to wear a black dress because that's what I feel best in, but that blush of colour also kind of added to the softness of how I wanted to feel that evening. That blush of colour was really something. I wasn't sure how I would feel about it, but it really works.

• You have built a phenomenal, international reputation on "strategic partnerships." Has this "strategic partnership" changed or enhanced how you view or conduct business? How has married life with a blended family influenced your business and/or philanthropic endeavors?

It's interesting; I mean, there are a few things. One, when we got together, he really is a breath of fresh air because he is so different from me. Like, I'm pretty serious, I'm pretty straitlaced. I work a lot, I'm happy working a lot. And he adds this incredible dimension of fun into my life, and into our life together. It's almost like the perfect balance for both of us. I bring myself to him and he brings himself to me, and it really works.

I've never really had that before. There's always been a sense of imbalance in previous relationships—not even in a bad way, just that they always felt like there was something





missing at different times. With this relationship, I never feel that. He's actually the only person I've gone into business with. We started our angel investment company about eight months ago and we've made a few really interesting investments. We just jibe and work so well together; we do that podcast together, called $\it The F Words$. It sounds so cliché, and I guess I've been searching for this for a very long time, but they say that when you find that person, you know it.

We knew it pretty quickly, because within the second or third date, he said, "Well, I'm going to change my Facebook status. Will you?" And I laughed, because *who does that?* But he was so authentic; there was no game-playing. I am what I am, and he's always present, all the time. It's refreshing. You don't find that very often. So for me, I didn't have to think about it; it just happened. Even getting engaged, and the way we got engaged it just all kind of happened.

We knew we wanted to get married, but didn't talk that much about it. And then we were in New York City after a Formula E race. We were walking past a jewelry store; we walked in, and he was like, "Oh, do you like this ring?" And it was a little awkward, because what do you say? But literally five minutes later, we were engaged! And he hadn't planned it, either; it was just one of those things. That's how our life is, and I think that's important. You have to be open; you have to flow. We live together, we do business together, and life just feels a lot more fun with him in it.

People tell you that you meet that person at different stages—sometimes you meet them in your twenties and sometimes you don't meet them until your forties. Or like my friend Jeanne Beker, she didn't meet her guy until her sixties. When you know, you know.

• What was your favourite element of your wedding event—from the planning process to that stunning gown, to the ceremony, reception, guest list, flowers, song choices, location, anything; what was your favourite detail?

I would say for me—it's probably different for Anthony, but for me, it would be my son's speech. It was extremely moving. If you ask Anthony that question, it would probably be his brother's speech. You know, ultimately it was about the people who were there, and those speeches really set the tone for the expression of love and vulnerability that evening. If I think about the next day, we sort of looked at each other and asked, "Do we feel different?" And we really did, we really felt married. We've both been married before, but neither of us had felt different before, I think a lot of that had to do with our loved ones and that overall expression of love.
